Dear Lower Elwha Tribal Community,

I don't know if everyone pays attention at the Lower Elwha Food & Fuel while filling up your gas tank. The Tribal Council recently authorized an additional \$.20 discount at the pump for tribal members of any tribe. This brings the total for the discount to \$.40 on the gallon. I thought this action was very gracious of the council.

We, the council, haven't given up on the constitutional amendments. Things have been real busy here lately. Although, I personally have been trying to get this done for a couple decades now. The lawyers have looked over the suggested nineteen amendments. We need to know how you, the voters, want to take this on. We could vote on the amendment getting the Department of Interior out of our constitution and then taking on the rest. We could also vote on amendments two to five at a time. There is also the possibility of This time, celebrating our dam removal just voting on all nineteen amendments at once. Another way is to just change the constitution altogether. I think we need to have at least a few meeting to inform the voters what is going to happen as far as process.

Just recently, the House Sustainable Energy & Environmental Coalition visited the Olympic National Park and the tribe. There were seven congress people and their aides. I felt it was a very good visit. We went to Hurricane Ridge and talked about the park's needs and our tribal concerns also. That afternoon we hiked up the Elwha River from the main gate to where the river washed out the road. We talked about the restoration successes and what we felt was needed to finish the

project. They were excited with their visit and promised to help out in any way they could. I plan on taking their word for it and propose to visit with them in D.C.

Our contractor has just finished up regrading and adding new asphalt to Charles Road here on the lower reservation. It looks and feels good to drive on. This was in our Transportation Plan for a few years now. Hopefully we can work on other roads within our reservation also.

The road was also completed in time for our mini-canoe youth canoe journey hosting. In addition to the new road, our grounds crew and summer youth employment are getting lawns ready for camping sites. It is really starting to look good around here again. We are expecting fourteen canoes to land at the end of Charles Road. Thank you to everyone involved.

I can't wait for our 2025 Canoe Hosting. That will be very exciting. Our last one was in 2005. Twenty years later we are at it again. efforts. We are planning and preparing for that also. Our elders and others are working on beading and other crafts for our give away. The council wants to encourage our artists and others to come forward with their crafts for our giveaway. More news on that to follow.

I have been busy with all the other treaty and fishing related activities and meetings also. Local, regional, national and international issues and meetings. This involves a lot of days away from the rez and my family. I would like to thank our families for their support as we council members dedicate our lives to our tribe. Without my family support, I wouldn't be able to do the work that I love.



Climate change and the impacts on the Elwha River were the main focus of the tour, with emphasis on ways to continue to protect and restore the Elwha River watershed and maintain the resources for the Klallam people of today and the future.

Water Conservation

With warmer days coming for August it's important to make sure we do our part to conserve water:

- Check your outside faucets every night to make sure they have not been left on.
- If you are a tenant report running toilets or leaks ASAP if you are a homeowner fix them ASAP, a lot of water can be wasted if not attended to early.
- If you have a septic with an alarm system that keeps going off, report ASAP or fix ASAP. If the alarm continues to go off it could indicate that the pump is working overtime which will flood your drain field and waste lots of water. The cause could be as simple as having a bad battery.
- Also check your yard for squishy areas which could indicate drain field flooding or a hose/faucet being left on.
- Swimming Pools: Use a small pool or tub to clean feet before jumping in to the pool, this will help keep the water clean longer and use less water.

Rental Assistance

First, Last and Deposit Program: We still have funds available if you are looking for assistance to rent a home.



- * This is a once in a lifetime grant that will pay your first and last month's rent along with your home and utility deposit.
- * You must qualify under the program guidelines.

We still have air purifiers for those that have not picked one up. We also have filters for those that received an air purifier from a different tribal program. Stop by to pick yours up or call the office to see if you are on the list.

America's Sugar Addiction

According to the American Heart Association, Americans consume around 60 pounds of sugar each year. That equals to 17 teaspoons a day, and the recommendation is only 6-9 teaspoons a day, (children 3-6 teaspoons/day).

How to read the label for sugar!

Four grams of sugar = 1 teaspoon.

Example: #1. 1c. Of lucky charms has 12 grams of sugar which = 3 teaspoons. If you eat 2 cups, you have to double the teaspoons.

Example #2. 12 ounce can of coke. 39 grams of sugar, which = 9.75 teaspoons.


